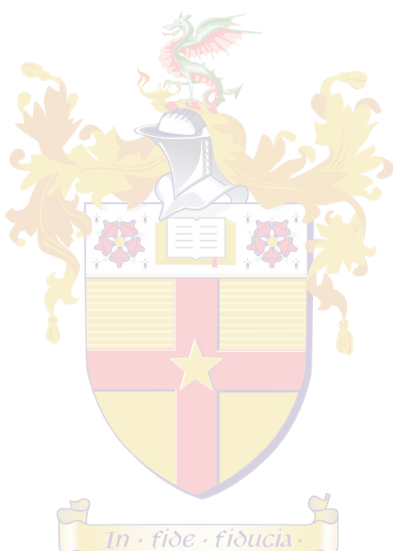

Mr Priestley Pays Tribute to Graham Chapman

On Wednesday 12 March, we lost a valued colleague, Graham Chapman. He died following a medical emergency. Graham was given immediate first aid when he collapsed and the emergency services were very quickly in attendance. Our wonderful colleagues in our Medical Centre, and others, did everything they could for him, but he couldn't be saved.

In Chapel I let the School community know, and we remembered him and his wife, Freda, in our prayers. The Bursar and I went to visit Freda at her home, and I know she was very pleased to think that we would be remembering her and honouring Graham, and praying for them both, in our service this morning.

It is very easy for me to write words of tribute for Graham, because he genuinely was a wonderful colleague. He had worked as one of our two School Porters here for the last ten years. To everyone who encountered him, he was a cheerful, engaging, characterful and positive colleague, who loved his work at The Leys. He was popular with everyone; he was a great Liverpool fan and he and I would often talk about that. He was one of those people who had a knack of making connections with people; he did that in all sorts of different ways right across the School community. All in all, he was a wonderful, collegiate presence, and he will be greatly missed by all of us at The Leys.

We have signposted to pupils and staff where they can get support if they are struggling with this very sad news and we told them that the Chapel will be left open all day today for any member of the School community - staff or pupil - who wants to remember Graham, or to pray for him, his wife and wider family.

Celebrating 150 Years

The Leys School, founded on 16 February 1875, marked its 150 anniversary with a Service of Thanksgiving at King's College Chapel on 14 February 2025. This flagship event was attended by all staff and pupils, along with a select group of invited guests. We are grateful to the Dean, Fellows, and staff of King's College, Cambridge, for their kindness and help in allowing us to celebrate our Sesquicentenary in their Chapel, as we did for our Centenary fifty years ago. For the event we commissioned a new piece of music, composed by visiting music teacher Lucy Walker, that captures the essence of the School's spirit.

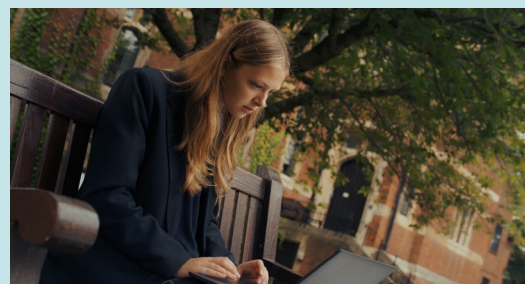

Noah Launches Fashion Brand

We are excited to share the remarkable achievements of Year 11 pupil, Noah R, who has successfully launched and grown his own fashion brand, Pintilie. Noah has long had a love of fashion and co-founded the brand with his friend Antonio, whom he met whilst running the social media for a trainer store in Cambridge.

Noah taught himself to sew, design and pattern his own garments. He and Antonio later worked with a textile manufacturer to develop and produce their first collection.

As part of the early promotion of the brand, Noah handmade bespoke items for fashion content creators who then made content that drove followers for Pintilie on Instagram. This created demand for the brand before a single piece was available. Pintilie's first collection for Fall/Winter 24 was released on Noah's 16th birthday in October, and included seven different products, both handmade '1 of 1' pieces and manufactured items. Noah also shoots and edits the photography and video for the brand's campaigns and promotions.



Profits from the first collection were reinvested into the brand's second release which launched at the end of January. Pintilie has now been bought by customers in over 25 countries.

Noah commented: "I'm learning so much. I don't know where this is going to take me, but it's incredibly exciting. The encouragement I've had from everyone here has been great."

We are incredibly proud of Noah's entrepreneurship, and we look forward to seeing the continued growth and success of Pintilie.

Mathematics Success for Misha

We are thrilled to announce the outstanding achievements of Lower Sixth pupil, Misha N, in the field of mathematics, where he has demonstrated exceptional dedication, earning recognition in both national competitions and academic publications.

Misha participated in the British Mathematical Olympiad (BMO) Round 1. His impressive performance has secured him a place in the highly competitive BMO Round 2. This is a remarkable accomplishment, as only approximately 100 pupils from Years 11-13 across the UK are invited to this prestigious second round.

In addition to his success in the BMO, Misha has been working independently on an article about plane geometry and mixtilinear incircles. His hard work and insightful research have paid off, as his article has been accepted for publication in the renowned magazine 'Mathematical Reflections'. The article was published in the latest issue on 16 January.

Dr Ayton, Misha's mathematics teacher, expressed her pride in his achievements, stating: "Misha's dedication and passion for mathematics are truly inspiring. His success in the British Mathematical Olympiad and his publication in 'Mathematical Reflections' are testaments to his intellectual curiosity. We are incredibly proud of him and look forward to his future accomplishments."

Girls' U16A VII Reach Semi Finals

The Girls' U16A VII, composed entirely of Year 10 and Year 9 players, showcased their talent and determination at the prestigious Northampton Saints Series Sevens Tournament held at Oundle School, reaching the Semi Finals. Building on this momentum, they went on to defeat Stamford, a team of Year 11 players, with a disciplined and high-energy performance, winning 21-10 and earning a place in the Main Cup Semi Final.



The Semi Final against Oakham, who would eventually win the tournament, was a hard-fought battle. Our girls pushed their opponents to the limit, displaying resilience and skill, despite the loss. Reaching the Semi Finals as the youngest team in the competition was a remarkable achievement, and the girls should be incredibly proud of their performance and growth throughout the day.

Boys' 1st VII Win Tournament

It would have been easy at a tournament like this to ease off or hide, but the boys fought for every scrap today. This team is such a special group, and they will remember today long after they leave The Leys, which is the greatest gift we can give them."

Pitlochry House Challenge this Easter

This Easter, we invite you to support our pupils as they take on the Pitlochry House Challenge. Taking place between 5-26 April, each House (with East and Granta combined) will aim to travel 855 miles, the equivalent of the journey to Pitlochry and back, under their own steam - whether by cycling, walking, running, swimming, or rowing. Why Pitlochry? This small Scottish town has special significance for The Leys, as the School was evacuated there during World War II, when our premises were taken over as an auxiliary hospital.

The fundraising effort is in aid of bursary places at The Leys, allowing us to offer a Leysian education to those who are well matched to our ethos and values, regardless of their financial circumstances. Each House will be aiming to raise £1,500 - that's about 16 miles and £27 per pupil in sponsorship. The Houses will unlock an extra £1,500 for each target that they hit - thanks to a generous match donor. This means your sponsorship of them could be doubled.


